Junior Year Checklist

| 1. Meet with the counselor to discuss what to do to prepare to apply to college. |
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| 2. Take the PSAT in October and go over the results. Work on weak areas. |
| 3. Do a web search of colleges, narrow down your search and visit those colleges. |
| 4. Take advantage of opportunities presented by the counselor, faculty and administration |
| regarding scholarships, service, etc. |
| 5. Register for the SAT and ACT to take early second semester. Prepare for them, |
| studying at least 20 hours. Retake for a better score if you need to but prepare again |
| first. Don't take more than three times. |
| 6. Update your portfolio. |
| 7. Request congressional nomination form and preliminary applications for the service |
| academies and complete these if you are interested in attending a military college |
| (West Point, Naval Academy, Air Force Academy). Apply for summer week at |
| camp at the military academy you want to attend. |
| 8. Keep up with your Community Service Project. |
| 9. Request letters of recommendation from your pastor, teachers, work supervisors, |
| coaches, etc. See that these are completed before school begins in the fall of your |
| senior year. |
| 10. If you plan to participate in intercollegiate sports in college, talk with your coach and |
| contact the colleges you wish to attend and request the proper forms (if they are |
| not on the website). You must file with the NCAA Clearing House if interested in |
| playing at a Division 1 or 2 college. Go online to their website to do this. |
| 11. Walk with God and pray for wisdom and discernment to make wise choices for now |
| and in the future. |
| 12. Build and protect a good reputation with teachers and fellow students. |

| 13. Ask three teachers second semester to write a recommendation for you and have them |
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| e-mail them to the counselor. |
| 14. Write an essay on your goals for the future. It should include your passions and be a |
| window into who you are. |
| 15. Review your transcript to make sure that it is completely accurate. |
| 16. Complete applications as soon as they are available online. It may be good to print |
| them out, fill them out, and then put in the information on the application online. |
| Plan to do as much as possible over the summer so that you alleviate much of the |
| stress in the fall meeting the November deadline for early decision, and early action. See |
| the "Juniors- Steps Towards College" list for the definitions of each. |
| 17. Do a scholarship search on the internet and in printed materials. When searching |
| online, use personal identifiers (things unique to you) combined with terms like |
| fund, trust fund, foundation, fellowship, etc. (e.g. Blind Scholarship Foundation). |
| Also search for scholarships for community or national brands like WalMart, Target, |
| Taco Bell, Chik-Fil-A, etc. Stay away from websites asking for really personal information |
| (SS#) or payment. (See "Juniors- Steps Towards College" list for helpful websites.). |
| 18. Make your summer count by either working, doing community service, attending an |
| enrichment camp, doing an internship in a career field in which you are interested, etc. |
